Governors Message

Congratulations go out to the Brampton Civitan Club members who hosted an excellent mid-year meeting last weekend at the Monte Carlo Inn in Vaughan. All went well, the lunch speakers were interesting, the dancers after dinner were amazing, and the participation in the meeting was excellent as well. You may have heard from those who attended that we announced the cancellation of Sno Do

by the Board of Directors of Civitan

After 44 very successful years, this was a great disappointment to those of us who participated year after year, but this is one more sign of the changing times, the changing culture in the US, and the change of guard at Head Office. The replacement function for the North American Junior Governors fund raiser is to be announced at the Junior Civitan International Convention in June, but so far we are informed it will be held probably at March break and in Birmingham, Alabama, to include the Civitan International Research Centre in at least part of the event. Governors will still need to raise funds in order to participate; full details will be announced as they are decided upon.

The Sno Do report given by liaison Past International President Bill Hiscott outlined the 2019 event itself, and the International Board discussion around "issues" surrounding weather and airlines that caused certain persons to be concerned about personal safety of themselves and Junior Civitans. Bill then went on to review the FAQ provided by International staff after the Board's decision to eliminate Sno Do and replace with a "yet to be determined" event.

We had invited former Civitan Don Hewitt (retired from Agincourt Civitan Club) to attend this meeting and outline some ideas that he had approached me with and that I took to our District Board meeting two weeks ago. The suggestion is that we develop a "new" project of some nature which will involve participation of the CDW Junior Civitans and the CDW adult Civitans, while maintaining the fund raising aspect in a competitive fashion. We have struck a committee headed by Bill Hiscott with assistance from Don Hewitt to review possibilities and report back at the District meeting at Region 5 with a view to implement in 2020. The new funds raised would stay in Canada! We hope that this initiative will re-energize Civitan in Canada and especially in Canadian District West, attracting new members as we go.

Hopefully, we will have periodic updates on progress, with the roll-out in September. Stay tuned.



100 Ways To Get The Word Out About Civitan

















- 51. Partner with the local schools to have a Civitan night at the local football/basketball game. Everybody wearing Civitan gear gets into the game at a discount and you could even feature potential service projects the club is doing at half-time.
- 52. Get your local pizza delivery place to tape info about Civitan or your fundraiser to their pizza box tops. This works best with a non-franchised restaurant.
- 53. Find out when volunteer groups at local agencies that serve people with I/DD meet. Offer to speak to the group.
- 54. If your community has a popular park, set up a table there or during an event there to promote Civitan. Make sure you have signage so you can explain what you're doing.
- 55. If you have the necessary equipment, post testimonial videos online on You Tube or Facebook to recruit new teams, and get the word out. You can even email this link out to various supporters.
- 56. Get with school leaders to organize a change collection among classes to benefit Civitan or the service project you're doing. This kind of competition among youngsters does lead to good word of mouth for your event or club. Make sure you send out appropriate letters to inform parents about the contest, and of course the event.
- 57. Send out email messages to your friends explaining why you're involved with Civitan. You may even include a picture of the reason why you're involved.
- 58. When you're painting the town, don't forget about the schools! You can put bows on lockers, classroom doors, car antennas, etc.
- 59. Display signs about Civitan somewhere in heavy traffic like drive-thrus or banks.
- 60. Get your club mentioned in the local PTA newsletters.
- 61. Put some information about Civitan, your service project, or fundraising event in local church bulletins. Specifically target the larger congregations.
- 62. Paint your car's windows with the word "Civitan" and some more information about the event. Just driving around town will get the word out. Encourage other members to do the same.
- 63. Send out e-vites to your friends about the next Civitan meeting. Encourage others to do the same.
- 64. See if your local dry cleaners will staple small flyers to the dry cleaning bags of their customers.
- 65. Start a video contest with your members over Facebook. Ask them each to shoot a 1 or 2 minute video explaining why they are a Civitan. Get them to post it on their Facebook pages. Give an award to the best video at the upcoming fundraiser or large meeting.
- 66. Take part in your community's local parades. Some cities have great Christmas parades, while others have Veterans' Day parades, St. Patrick's Day parades, etc.
- 67. Have your mayor or county judge sign a proclamation declaring a Civitan day, week or month. Make sure you get some media coverage of it if possible.
- 68. If you give out any "goodies" to supporters, use balloons. Make sure they're delivered during business hours so people around can see the presentation, and learn more about Civitan.
- 69. Get with other club members to see if they've issued any membership or fundraising challenges between businesses or organizations. Sometimes these can help generate talk value, and media opportunities.
- 70. Take advantage of any morning announcements at your local schools. Get Junior Civitan info in there!
- 71. Get your committee on the local radio or cable show to answer questions about Civitan.
- 72. Find ways to tap into a unique community event. For example, if your town has a huge bass fishing tournament, see if you can have a "Fishing For Civitan Members" booth.
- 73. If you have a downtown shopping area, place blue foot prints (paint or chalk) on sidewalks to promote the fact Civitan lets you "Take Steps to Serve Your Community."
- 74. If you use photo sharing services online like Shutterfly, send the link to your Civitan album (with pictures from club meetings, fundraisers and service projects), out to get people pumped about this year's event.
- 75. Take a cue from politicians. Get Civitan supporters to show their support through yard signs.

CIVITAN INTERNATIONAL RESEARCH CENTER

The Civitan International Research Center (CIRC) was created in 1989 with a \$20 million pledge from Civitan International. Since opening in 1992, the CIRC has emerged as a world leader in the research and treatment of Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (I/DD) and other brain-related conditions which impact the lives of one in six people worldwide.



GROUNDBREAKING DISCOVERIES

Civitan-funded scientists have discovered dietary supplements of an essential amino acid can reduce seizure events and improve memory in patients after seizures. This study is currently seeking approval for human trials. Memory loss is common after seizures. Additionally, 30% of patients with Autism suffer seizure events.

Civitan-funded scientists discovered a drug composed of scorpion venom could be used to deliver treatment to inoperable brain tumors without harming nearby healthy cells.

Civitan-funded scientists have discovered a drug treatment which may improve breathing and brain function in Rett syndrome. Rett patients commonly go long periods of time holding their breath which can disrupt nutrition and heart function.

Civitan-funded researchers have identified treatment modifications for glioblastoma, the most devastating form of human brain cancer.

LIFE CHANGING RESEARCH

Civitan scientists are using MRI scans and driving simulators to study the brain activity of autism patients and how they react to stress or distractions while driving a car.

Civitan scientists are studying how adults with Alzheimer's conditions withstand the onset of dementia. This can help target ways to delay or prevent dementia in patients who develop the disease.

Civitan researchers are studying visual cues and nervous system processing in relation to the development of nearsightedness.

Civitan researchers are studying how inflammation in the nervous system relates to the development of glioblastoma (brain tumors), ALS, and strokes.

IMPACTFUL TOOLS

The Civitan International Neuroimaging Laboratory features the fastest MRI scanner currently available for human use. It provides clearer images for study while the higher speeds allow researchers to capture brain activity more accurately.

Civitan researchers are using robot technology to help patients with autism maintain eye contact in conversations, improve social skills, and interpret facial expressions more accurately.

This is a great new feature. We understand the frustration of entering the amount owed in US funds. However, you can quickly pay quarterly dues and no more mailing checks. Club Officers Elections & 2019 Officers Training: According to club bylaws, your club should be conducting its annual election during the months of March, April or May. Good luck with this process. This past month the international board amended CI Policy 0404 to state all presidents, presidents-elect, secretaries and treasures MUST be trained annually for a Civitan club to remain in-good-standings. Even if you are repeating in the office, you MUST attend training. President and president-elect training dates for Canadian clubs are June 8 in Dundas, Ontario and June 15 in Almonte, Ontario. 





The program is open to all Special Needs families of all ages and is supported by the Agincourt Civitan Club both financially and with volunteers.

Barrie Civitan Club- 44 Years of Participation Come to an End!!

The Barrie Civitan Club is saddened to advise that after 44 years the Junior Civitan International Sno-Do event has been cancelled by the action of the Civitan International Board of Directors. The running of the Sno-Do event has come down to "Fund Raising".

For the 2019 Sno-Do event required the ceasing of the billeting of Junior Governors in "Canadian" homes. The event was changed to the Wildfire Lodge where we could house everyone together but about five weeks before the weekend there was a failure of the boiler system at the lodge and the pipes froze causing a large leak in the plumbing and rendered the facility inoperable. We had to move all the participants to Hotels in Midland. The Community Centre was acquired to feed everyone and gather for meetings.

The weather didn't co-operate and the snow in the area melted the week before the event. A new event was added for the Sunday afternoon at Wye Marsh Nature Centre.

There are several experiences beyond fund raising that were rolled into the Sno-Do event while the Governors attended Barrie/Midland Ontario, Canada that are now part of history for those who had the opportunity of attending.

Civitan International took over the event with the "New Concept" and the Junior representative to the Civitan International Board criticized the bus driver for his driving in 60 mile per hour winds as a major safety factor. Other Junior Governor's did not make it into Buffalo until Saturday due to landing conditions. The criticism went further to the local Civitan's for a lack of support, so far from the truth, we had everything covered and had several Canadian Juniors there to meet the leaders of our Junior organization!

A special THANK YOU to the local Civitan's, friends and commercial companies that made the event the success it was for 2019 and the past.

~After 6 days without a change of new address with MTO: \$230

~Driving without insurance cause an accident:

\$ 5000 and license suspended for 5 years

~Through a red light: \$ 900

~Crossing two solid yellow lines: \$50

~U-Turn and turn violation: \$350

~Speeding (from 1-15km over): \$250

~Speeding (from 16-25km over): \$450

~Driving too slow: \$399

~Fail to Full stop at Stop Sign: \$270

~Passing School bus :bus: \$885

~Parking in Bus Lane or Zone :bus:: \$900

~Fail to turn on head lights (30 minutes)


