Civitan International Relocates HQ from Birmingham to U.S. 280 Corridor

A non-profit with more than 100 years of Birmingham-headquartered history has sold its property and relocated from Birmingham to the U.S. 280 corridor.

Civitan International, which has been located at One Civitan Place just off Montclair Road for nearly 50 years, has sold its building to Beatty Construction for \$2.2 million and has leased just over 6,200 square feet at 500 Corporate Parkway in Hoover.

The organization is the first tenant in the newly renovated Meadow Brook office complex.



"We needed a space that was flexible and fulfilled the unique needs we have as a more than centuryold organization," said <u>Scarlet Thompson</u>, executive vice president of Civitan International. "As the headquarters for our more than 22,000 members across the world, we maintain a hefty trove of information and historic artifacts. There were not a lot of spaces available for lease in the Birmingham area that could provide what we found at 500 Meadow Brook."

The new location is a third of the size of its former location. Thompson said the organization needed to downsize as it has become more versatile and streamlined over the years because of technology, going from 40 employees to 11 since 1976.

She said Civitan celebrated its 100th anniversary in 2017 and decided then to embark on a "journey of renewal" to stay relevant and fulfill its mission of making a difference in the lives of those with intellectual and developmental disabilities in more meaningful ways.

"We went through a staff leadership transition, started doing a lot of things differently to be better stewards of our resources and are even currently looking at our internal membership structure," Thompson said. "This move is part of this journey we deemed 'Renew by 22.' Staying in a world headquarters building that was three times the size of what we needed did not reflect the spirit of the direction in which we are going. Our international board of directors decided that Civitan was not the brick and mortar in which we operated; it was the people and the mission we served. So, they boldly gave me the approval to proceed with selling our building off Montclair Road."

2022 CIVITAN INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION JULY 4-7, 2022 SAN ANTONIO, TEXAS

Will the certification process be different with this new virtual option

Club presidents will be asked to assign/identify their respective club's voting delegates as well as governors for district delegates using an online form that will be introduced by April 1st. From there, the information as to its own certification and whether it has fulfilled the qualifications of a Civitan club/district in good standing will be reviewed. Virtual voters will get an email in advance of the online voting to confirm their inclusion as a delegate. In-person voters will check-in with members of the election committee prior to voting.

Are there any unique rules for this year's election since it is hybrid

Yes, one important rule this year will be there will be no "standby" voters. If the designated voting delegates do not register to allow voting or place their vote, there is no way to substitute in other voters using the system we will have as well as having both the virtual participation vote and the in-person vote happening simultaneously online.



How will virtual voting actually work

Once voting delegates are registered for the convention, your information will be confirmed and passed along to the election software company under strict secure measures. That company will send out an email in advance of the election to confirm the voter and share next steps. An additional email will be sent out prior to Tuesday, July 5, with each voter's unique credentials (username and password). Virtual voters will be directed to a website in which to place their vote with their credentials once voting is open.

How will virtual registrants take part in general sessions

If you register as a virtual participant for the 2022 convention, you will be able to vote and witness three general sessions, including First Business Session, Elections Business Session and Membership Extravaganza. These sessions will be live streamed via the internet similar to Zoom meetings.



DELEGATE SUBMISSION DEADLINES.

The window to designate voting delegates for a club or district will close on May 15th, 2022. No delegates may be submitted after this time, nor may they be substituted.

Cancellation Policy

No refunds will be given for virtual attendee registration, for any reason, at any time.

CREDENTIALS & VOTING

In-person voting delegates will receive their voting credentials on site, during the dedicated voting time. Once you pick up your credentials, you will proceed to tables in the voting area that have iPads to complete your ballot. You will not be able to use your own devices to cast your vote.

Ideas For Garnering <u>New Members</u>

- 1.) Check with local Universities or High School to see if they are having a volunteer fair, or in the case of University, a club fair. Try to get permission to have a display/attendee, - Junior-Seniors
- 2.) See if your local TV has an ad page or does interviews.
- 3.) Snap magazine will often feature charity or not for profit events.
- 4.) Do something in conjunction with another entity, like hold a joint event where they get 50% of the profits.
- 5.) Try a local retirement home, they often are looking for events, maybe a joint fundraiser in their location like a euchre tournament, or bingo, or craft event would generate interest in your club.
- 6.) At a Civitan international meeting it was stated by a Governor that they have a rep/member in their club from any other entity that they help. For example, London Civitan Club just had a member of CLL join the London Middlesex club, that they do 90% of their programs for/with them.
- 7.) If you belong to a group like a book club, knitting bee, travel club, bring a pamphlet to your club.
- 8.) If you still work check with co-workers, maybe leave a pamphlet in the lunchroom, on a community board.
- 9.) At the local library they often have pamphlets, or community boards.
- 10.) Some malls have a community board-fundraisers approved by them can be posted on their board, they might allow not for profit, or seek night info to be posted.
- 11.) Bring club info/pamphlets to any event you hold.
- 12.) Have an info booth at a local festival, or sporting event. Give out something, pencil, ball, Frisbee, with your clubs contact on it.



Ideas For Member Retention

- 1) Thank your members, always. Let them know how much you appreciate their efforts
- 2) Get them involved, ask members to head a committee, social event, be a good will ambassador
- 3) Acknowledge each members birthday, send a card. Have an acknowledgement monthly at your meeting. Maybe share a multi birthday cake/cupcakes.
- 4) Acknowledge members other events/milestones. Are they a new grandparent-hold a shower? Did they just have an anniversary-send a card? Did they just marry-send a gift/card?
- 5) Make up certificates to give out after an event to organizers.
- 6) Make a job description and list of the event schedule to get people potentially wanting to take on a project/fundraiser. Allow/encourage someone to shadow a project/fundraiser chair to learn.
- 7) Allow members to speak at meetings, get their feed back, hear their ideas.
- 8) Have an info night whenever a new member is installed to bring them up to speed on the club officers, projects, fundraisers. You can make a video or power point and update as needed.
- 9) Hold a dinner meeting/social for your members at different locations. If you usually stay in your club house or 1 location switch it up. If you have a budget for this then give each member that amount towards the event, and they pay the difference. (creates interest in members and community.) Go bowling, go on a trip to the theatre, have a picnic. Fellowship!
- 10) Give club awards yearly, monthly.
- 11) Have members contribute to the club social media, photos, posters, make a tiktok.
- 12) Make meetings a social occasion as well. Bring nibbles, coffee etc. That birthday cake! Or plan to go out after the meeting for dinner, etc.
- 13) For your fellow clubs in the district, if you have a good project or fundraiser in your area... Please consider doing up a project report, list the event, steps to take to run it, how many people it takes to run this project etc. and pass it on to your Area Director for distribution. Pass it on!




DID YOU KNOW...?

 ${f I}$ own syndrome is named after John Langdon Down, a British physician who was the first to classify the condition in 1866. John Langdon Down began his career as chief physician of Earlswood, an institution for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities. Prior to Earlswood, John Down had no experience caring for people with these types of disabilities. But something about them interested him. He saw their value and their humanity in a time when others didn't. He genuinely enjoyed being around them, and he became infuriated by the way they were treated. Corporal punishment was common, there was poor hygiene, high mortality rates, and nothing enjoyable or worthwhile for the patients to do. John Langdon Down insisted on change. He hired all new staff, demanded proper care and hygiene, prohibited punishment, and offered crafts and hobbies to his patients. He took beautiful portraits of his patients, dressing them in their nicest gowns and suits, and posing them in flattering ways. He used this portrait collection of over 200 photos to support his clinical description of Down syndrome, pointing out the physical features he noticed as well as the other clinical observations he made. In 1868, he bought a large white mansion as a home for people with Down syndrome, rather than an "institution". He ensured that the mansion met the highest standards of comfort and hygiene. All people who were brought to the mansion were privately educated. They were taught to ride horses, garden, and craft. Creative outlets were provided and he had a small theater built as an addition to the mansion. This mansion was called Normansfield. and is still around today in the UK. Now, it is named The Langdon Down Center and Normansfield Theater. So "Down" has nothing to do with delays, or disposition, or prognosis of the syndrome. It's just named after a really, really cool person.



1 1/2 tsp. vanilla extract
2 large eggs

1 can raspberry pie filling

Preheat oven to 350F and line an 8x8 inch baking pan with parchment paper and set to the side. Combine graham cracker crumbs, sugar, and melted butter together in a small bowl and stir. Press into the baking pan to create the crust and bake for 8 minutes. While crust is cooling, beat together cream cheese, lemon zest, sugar, sour cream, flour, and vanilla extract.

Beat in the eggs last and pour mixture into the pan.

Spoon raspberry pie filling in small circles around the cheesecake and use a knife to make swirl designs. Bake for 35 minutes and let cool completely before chilling in the fridge for 2-3 hours.





Robert Dietz

He became a Judge of Compensation Claims in August of 2013 and was highly respected for his fairness, integrity, and professionalism with all persons who appeared before him. He was also an adjunct professor at Barry University School of Law teaching the workers' compensation law. This past weekend, the State of Florida lost one of its best Judges of Compensation Claims in JCC Robert Dietz. He was not only a good judge, known throughout the workers' compensation law community as knowledgeable, fair and professional, he was an even better man. I (<u>Paul N. White-Davis, Esq.</u>) had the privilege of being invited by him to be a guest lecturer for his law school class on Workers' Compensation law on multiple occasions and was a member of his lecture group for our local Inns of Court. I will miss him. I will say a prayer for serenity and comfort for his loved ones.

Robert Lee Dietz has been a Florida Bar member since May 1984. Dietz received his board certification in 1992. In 1995, he became a Supreme Court Certified Circuit Civil Mediator.

He was recognized by the Florida Supreme Court on January 28, 2010 when he received the Florida Bar President's Pro Bono Award for his pro bono work at the Legal Aid Society of the Orange County Bar Inc., participating in its pro bono panel for more than 20 years, while additionally providing service as a guardian ad litem for children in the juvenile dependency system over the last 23 years. His giving back to the community especially children was very important to him. Because many of the children suffer cognitively and psychologically; lack parental and familial care; were abused, neglected, and harmed in various ways; they become extremely close to the guardian ad litem. Over the years, Robert Dietz served as a guardian ad litem for more than 100 children, bringing joy to the guardian ad litem children by doing things such as: taking them roller-skating, organizing Christmas gift drives, going out for pizza, and a group trip to Sea World. He has used his skills as a litigator to free children from dangerous and harmful households. He donated more than 1,130 hours to guardian ad litem pro bono work was responsible for recruiting other lawyers to do pro bono service.

Robert Dietz also participated in several organizations such as: Open House Ministries, Touching Miami with Love, ABA TIPS Workers' Compensation and Employer Liability Committee, the Florida Defense Lawyers' Association, and a Fellow of The College of Workers' Compensation and Civitan International where he organized and ran golf tournaments to assist developmentally disabled children. He also served on the PTA/SAC Committee at the middle school where his wife works and is active in church ministries
