#### Letter from the Board Chair - Water First

The first step is accepting the situation fully as it is. Too often we make things worse either by trying to do more than we should or by lapsing into feelings of uselessness. In both cases, we run the risk of actually prolonging our dependency. In addition, we miss a valuable opportunity to practice acceptance and humility. The ego resists what is, so when we move into acceptance we move into the deeper realm of the soul. In needing others and allowing them to help us, we experience the full realization that we are not on our own in the world. While this may bring up feelings of vulnerability, a deep feeling of gratitude also may emerge as we open to the experience of being helped. This realization can enable us to be wiser in our service of others when we are called upon to help.

It takes wisdom and strength to surrender to our own helplessness and to accept that we, just like every other human being, have limitations. The gifts of surrender are numerous. We discover humility, gratitude, and a deepening understanding of the human experience that enables us to be that much more compassionate and surrendered in the world.




#### London-Middlesex Civitan Club - #2383 President Darrell Blackwell

The club continue to volunteer at our weekly bingo event which is our biggest fundraiser.


In November we provided and served food to the participants in a Community Living Huronia curling bonspiel and did the same in Dec. for an Ontario special Olympic curling qualifier.



Bruce was an energetic member of the Oakville Civitan Club for many years.



#### A TRIBUTE GIVEN IN MEMORY OF DOUG GUTHRIE

Good afternoon; Civitan, Oakville Community Living, Distress Centre Halton, dear guests. It is a privilege for our family to be with you today. How is kindness measured? To me it is born and nurtured deep within one's soul. It emerges into the world, shines and is personified through that person's everyday actions. It's reflected in the intention of their heart and their thoughts. It is purity. Physically, it's illuminated through one's eyes and with their presence when someone is speaking to them. My father-in-law, Doug Guthrie was the complete and unconditional embodiment of the expression of human kindness. Another word might be selflessness; Doug's thoughtful nature toward others. And his compassion and empathy to those that needed a leg up was always on Doug's mind. I am speaking with you today about my life with Doug not as my father-in law, although that was the most profound aspect of our relationship - but rather Doug's life as a member of Civitan - behind the scenes; in his home when we would visit. At our house for dinner and other family get togethers. When Doug and Jeannine were at our home for dinner Doug always sat to my left. Me being righthanded, I reasoned it was easier for me to keep his wine glass topped up. I'm kidding. Sort of. I wanted to speak with him and learn from him, what was going on and what was new. Mostly, I loved chatting with him. We would speak about a range of current events and other topics just like anyone would. But what struck me on every occasion was his deep respect for Civitan, its mission and purpose. He loved his fellow members. Doug was completely dedicated to the support and health of community organizations like Community Living Oakville, Distress Centre Halton and other entities that Civitan supports - and to the invaluable volunteers who work tirelessly to keep these organizations thriving with the important work they do and the people they serve. Mostly, though, Doug thought of the people with whom your organizations serve; their lives, challenges and vulnerability. He spoke frequently about how he had hoped that in some small way the work that Civitan did made a difference. That it eased someone's pain, made their day a bit brighter, offered them hope - and a place at the table, where every human being deserves to be. Of all the roles Doug took on at Civitan from way back at the old fishing Derby each Spring at the now long-gone Holiday Inn near Oakville Place, to the weekly Bingos at Delta Bingo to, admittedly his baby, the Farmer's Market, Doug was constant in his commitment to the success and well being of every person who on any level was touched by Civitan; fellow members, family, organizations, and the community as a whole. From the farmers market years ago at Hopedale Mall Doug was a fixture every Saturday. He'd wander around speaking with the vendors and customers. In those days he'd leave the market midmorning to drive back home to pick up his wife, Jeannine. They'd return and go inside the mall for breakfast at El Spero and then back outside to the market. When the market moved to its current location at Dorval Crossing there was Doug again. That one pillar every week; speaking with and enjoying everyone; totally present with each conversation. He'd take a break inside of McDonald's and be back out again. And on it went, week after week, season after season. But if I were to illustrate the depth of Doug's character, grit, his sense of service and deep moral obligation to a mission larger than himself, it would be when the pandemic fell upon us in March of 2020. That was a time in our lives that no one will forget. While many people came through the pandemic relatively unscathed, many more did not. And many more than that still bear the emotional scars that that time of isolation and the loss of hope gripped them with. With the world and everything we held dear to it on hold, I remember a conversation I had with Doug at his home. His primary concern was what would happen

to the Community organizations if Civitan didn't have the financial resources to support them with. Doug pondered that without a market that year, how would the vendors, the farmers and merchants, how would they survive if they didn't have a place to come to each week to sell their goods and earn an income to feed their own families with. And what about the loyal customers who had supported the market over the years. What about them? Doug had always viewed the farmer's market as a social hub. A physical place to gather. But in 2020 this was amplified in Doug's mind. The market, to him, became a destination where people could emerge from their homes and shed their isolation. To have even a short time to actually speak with another human being, buy some goods and feel semi-normal again - even if it was all at six feet apart and masked up. And so, in March of 2020, Doug's mantra became - whatever it took; government regulations, hand sanitizers, distance markers and other precautions - the market would happen. It took a lot out of Doug in terms of sourcing supplies such as ropes, pylons, distance stickers on the ground and other necessities to get the market up and running. He recruited his Civitan family and others. Everyone happily pitched in. Doug spent countless hours on the phone and on email ensuring that the vendors felt comfortable in attending. With everything finally in place, the market opened the first weekend of July. Doug and his small crew of helpers arrived to the market location in the pre-dawn darkness to set everything up. It was labour-intensive and at times inconvenient as to what he could and couldn't do. But there Doug was, greeting the vendors as they arrived. Thanking the customers and asking them how were they managing, day-today. As he always did, Doug walked around from stall to stall, masked, to ensure everyone had everything they needed to be successful. The Civitan Farmer's Market of 2020 was a success; all from six feet apart. But what everyone didn't know about Doug was that in 2020 he was at the very beginning of the abyss of dementia. Dementia as many of us know is an insidious and indiscriminate brute. But Doug soldiered on week-after-week with his market and other social activities. Not once did he allow his growing confusion to impede his joy, sense of service and the person we knew Doug to be. The rest of our family pitched in to help with emails, organizing the market details and logistics - as did Doug's Civitan family. In the winter of 2022 Doug realized, reluctantly, that it was time to pass the torch of the 2023 farmer's market to his Civitan cohort. With the grace and dignity with which he'd conducted his life, Doug was appointed Honorary Mayor of the Civitan Farmer's Market. I watched as he was received by absolutely everyone at the market with the same kindness, patience, gentleness, compassion and love that he'd shown so many others for so many years. We lost Doug last February 1st. When Al and George spoke with the family about establishing the Douglas Guthrie Legacy Fund to recognize Doug's life and contributions to Civitan and to the organizations it serves, our hearts were full with gratitude and deep appreciation. I speak for our family when I say that I believe all of our lives are blessed for having been touched by Doug's soul. Douglas Guthrie was Civitan.
